Background

Tate's vision is to serve as artistically adventurous and culturally inclusive art museums for the UK and the world. We deliver this through activities in our four galleries across the UK (Tate, Tate St Ives, Tate Britain, Tate Modern, Tate Liverpool and Tate St Ives), our digital platforms and collaborations with our national and international partners. At the heart of Tate is our collection of art, which includes British art from the 16th century to the present day, and international modern art from 1900 to the present day.

The International Slavery Museum (ISM) opened on 23 August 2007. Not only was this the date of the annual Slavery Remembrance Day, but the year 2007 was particularly significant as it was the bicentenary of the abolition of the British slave trade. ISM highlights the international importance of slavery, both in a historic and contemporary context. Working in partnership with other museums with a focus on freedom and enslavement, the museum provides opportunities for greater awareness and understanding of the legacy of slavery today. Located in Liverpool's Albert Dock, only yards away from the dry docks where 18th century slave trading ships were repaired and fitted out, the museum is part of National Museums Liverpool (NML) – one of the world's great museum services and the largest cultural organisation in the North-West of England. Comprising eight highly regarded museums and galleries, NML employs over 700 staff and works closely with around 250 volunteers and goes further than a traditional museum service through innovative programmes – for example supporting those suffering from loneliness and dementia through our internationally recognised House of Memories programme, improving mental health and wellbeing and supporting local creative industries. NML exists for public benefit as an inspiring educator, a storyteller, a major employer and custodian of historic stories and assets.

About the role

The new post is hybrid curatorial role, working across our Exhibitions and Learning Departments at Tate Liverpool and with curatorial teams at ISM to transform traditional curatorial practice and put new methods of working with communities at the heart of the institutions' activities.

The role will work with both the International Slavery Museum and Tate Liverpool's Exhibitions and Learning Departments. We aim to inspire new ways of learning with art, and specifically with Tate's collection for all our audiences. We do this by working with artists and partners to develop and produce a programme of activities, resources and events that have enjoyment at their heart and reflect the diversity of artistic and cultural practices, and the communities we serve. We aim to offer the highest quality programme developed by a dedicated team that has a profound understanding of both art and how to design and implement programmes that maximise learning experiences for all our visitors.

What you will do

- Work within and for communities across Merseyside to deliver a high-quality, innovative programme of exhibitions and displays related events and strategic projects designed to engage diverse local audiences at Tate and National Museums Liverpool.
- Contribute to research and development of future programme at Tate Liverpool.
- Contribute to setting strategic direction for community and audience engagement at Tate Liverpool and the International Slavery Museum.
- Research and curate exhibitions, displays commissions and learning activities at Tate Liverpool and ISM.
- Contribute to Tate's Collection Displays Research Framework, focusing on post-colonial perspectives.
- Together with the Content Editor, work alongside the curatorial team towards developing new Interpretation Framework.
- Support the exhibitions programme through talks, tours and other events for a variety of audiences, including Patrons and Corporate Partners.
- Build and strengthen new and existing relationships with local community groups
- Work in partnership with local organisations to develop relevant cross-site programming.
- Deliver a programme of events aimed at sharing best practice in the realm of participatory curatorial practices.
- Act as Tate Liverpool and ISM ambassador within communities, representing the organisations at key events locally, nationally, and internationally.

What you will bring to the team

- Extensive experience of developing, implementing, and managing the delivery of cultural engagement programmes which engage diverse audiences and community groups
- Demonstrable experience of developing programme with artists, academics, creative practitioners to develop public programme collaboratively

- Demonstrable experience of curating exhibitions and commissions in the museum or gallery context
- Curatorial flair a track record of devising and delivering exhibitions and working with communities in innovative formats.
- Demonstrable familiarity with post-colonial discourse reflected in research and curatorial practice
- Excellent organisational skills including demonstrable ability to plan and deliver multiple projects simultaneously to time, to budget and to a high standard.
- Awareness and commitment to issues of diversity and inclusion as they affect the work
 of a major museum and evidence of having incorporated diversity strategies into
 learning and curatorial practice
- A proactive approach to embedding diversity and inclusion into all programming.
- Excellent facilitation skills to encourage the sharing of ideas and collaborative working between people
- Excellent communication skills and ability to approach situations appropriately and with sensitivity
- First-class research skills as well as excellent writing skills, including the capacity to write authoritative texts for a specialist readership as well as accessible texts for a general public, project documents and reports.
- Collaborative, open to work flexibly as part of the team
- Open to change and new ideas and evidence of the ability to reflect upon own practice and to make changes and improvements.
